## **Anti-Bullying**



Our message is simple: Bullying will not be tolerated at our school - you must **TELL** an adult.

As part of our anti-bullying work this term, we have been looking at the definition of bullying, the different forms that it can take and what the children should do if either they are being bullied or they know someone who is.

We have agreed that bullying is **repeated** behaviour that overtime causes distress and pain to the victim, but it is not falling out or a one-off incident.

We have agreed that bullying can be:

**Physical bullying -** hitting, kicking, tripping, pinching and pushing or damaging property

**Verbal bullying-** name calling, insults, teasing, intimidation, homophobic or racist remarks, or verbal abuse. While verbal bullying can start off harmless, it can escalate to levels which start affecting the individual target.

**Social bullying-** lying and spreading rumours, negative facial or physical gestures, menacing or contemptuous looks, playing nasty jokes to embarrass and humiliated, mimicking unkindly, encouraging others to social exclude someone, damaging someone's social reputation or social acceptance.

**Cyber bullying** – SENDING abusive or hurtful texts, emails or posts, images or videos, deliberately excluding others online, nasty gossip or rumours or imitating others online or using their log-in.

We encourage children to TELL an adult straight away if either they or someone they know is being bullied. For further details, please refer to our Anti-Bullying Policy published on our website.

Percentage Attendance	= to days	How this effects your child's learning
100% Excellent	0 days	Pupils with 100% attendance should achieve the best grades they can.
Above 97% - Very Good	6 days absence	Pupils with this attendance should achieve the best grades they can.
95% and above – Good	10 days	Pupils with this attendance are likely to achieve their target grades. When attendance falls this low a referral to the pupil welfare officer will be made.
90% attendance – Unsatisfactory	19 days	Pupils are missing a month of school per year fall behind in Maths & English. Gaps will start to show in their learning and could lead to poor grades.
85% attendance  – Cause for concern	29 days absence	Pupils are missing 6 weeks of school; it will be difficult for them to keep up and achieve their best.
80% attendance – serious concerns	1 day EVERY week	It will be almost impossible to keep up with work. Parents of pupils with this level of attendance could be issued with a penalty notice and it could lead to court action. It's not fair on the child and their chances for the future.
