Ofsted Report

At the end of our last academic year, we had our OFSTED inspection.

We are always striving for the very best for all of our children. We are delighted with the report but at Marton we are never complacent. The report is a real testament to the whole Marton Team – children, staff, parents and carers.

We have received the report after our latest Ofsted monitoring inspection visit. We are pleased to see that the hard work and commitment of staff, pupils, parents, and carers continues to be positively recognised in the outcomes of this report. Some of the standout comments are detailed below:

- Leaders have created a strong culture where the whole-school community lives the school motto of 'Working together to be the best that we can be'
- Leaders have developed a carefully constructed and aspirational curriculum that meets pupils' needs and interests
- Leaders' curriculum is designed to enable pupils, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), to achieve well across a broad range of subjects
- Leaders prioritise reading. They want pupils to experience a rich and varied range of literature, including poetry
- Leaders work closely with parents, carers, and external specialists to make sure that pupils with SEND get the expert help that they need
- Leaders' considerable experience, and careful approach, means that pupils with SEND learn effectively across the school
- Teachers check how well pupils are learning the curriculum
- Pupils enjoy attending this school. They feel happy and safe
- Pupils develop strong and trusting bonds with staff
- Pupils behave well, build new knowledge securely and mix together harmoniously
- Pupils are respectful. They do not judge each other. Rather they celebrate the rich diversity in the school
- Pupils strive to make a difference in the community. They work collaboratively to enhance the local environment and are keen to use the onsite forest and sensory garden
- Pupils have a strong sense of social justice
- Pupils develop their talents in different ways. For example, they regularly attend a wide range of after-school clubs
- Pupils are respectful of other cultures and traditions
- · Pupils know how to keep themselves fit. They understand the importance of eating healthily and exercising regularly
- Parents are positive about the school. Many describe their children's learning as being transformed by the care and support that they receive from staff

As Head of School, I am delighted that the inspector was able to observe the many positive outcomes achieved by pupils each day which, as highlighted, are as a result of the whole school community living our school motto. I would like to thank our wonderful pupils, staff, parents, and carers for the contribution they make to Marton where we work together to create a warm, caring environment that places children and their achievements at the heart of all we do."
